

Removing barriers to cross-border rail services in Central Europe

Subject of the proposal

Improvement of cross-border rail transport for passengers, with a particular focus on regional transport

■ Priority of the Central Europe programme

Specific objective 4.1: To improve planning and coordination of regional passenger transport systems for better connections to national and European transport networks

Description of the situation

- There are regions in Central Europe without any regional rail transport across borders
- As well in regions with existing cross-border rail transport there are barriers endangering the sustainability of offers, including aspects of legal regulation and financing provisions as well as aspects of marketing, information and ticketing
- Offers of long-distance rail transport are reduced by national operators, and regional rail transport is expected to replace these offers
- Challenge: Lack of accessibility of border areas with rail transport, limiting the possibilities for sustainable economic development

Aims and challenges

- 1. To make better use of existing transport offers, e.g. through solutions for connecting mobility, integrated ticketing (tariffs & sales), marketing, and passenger information
- 2. To improve and create transport offers, with regard to regional transport as well as with regard to long-distance transport

Examples:

- Connections with high and stable demand (e.g. commuter trains, connections between and within agglomerations, tourist areas with good accessibility)
- Connections with low or fluctuating demand (e.g. seasonal connections and connections in rural areas, connections for tourists)








Crucial challenge: In nearly all border areas stakeholders of different type and level must (or should) cooperate to make things work out

- Regional responsibility: DE / IT / CZ
- Mixed responsibility:
 AT / PL
- Centralised responsibility: HU / SK / SI / HR



Possible partners

- Organisers & operators of regional & long-distance railway transport
- Operators and suppliers of travel information systems
- Transport ministries, local and regional stakeholders
- Interest groups (e.g. passenger representation groups, environmental organisations), universities

10-12 partners, cross-border "teams" of partners possible

Activities and work packages

The activities and the work plan of the project shall be organised according to thematic work packages (WP). The themes of the work packages will be identified taking into account the priorities of partners. All themes shall be connected to tangible pilot activities aimed at the preparation and implementation of improvements of cross-border rail services.

Budget & duration

Project budget: approx. 2-3 Mio. EUR (approx. 100.000-250.000 EUR per partner) Project duration: 36 months (2016-2018)
